2016 Ag Excellence Alliance Forum & Awards Evaluation

Objectives

The evaluation provides feedback from forum participants to the Ag Excellence Committee, the GRDC, DEWNR, PIRSA, Natural Resources Murray Darling Basin, Natural Resources Adelaide Mount Lofty, SAGIT and Grains Growers Limited, all of who provided financial support for running the forum. This information will be used to inform future forums and initiatives of the Ag Excellence Alliance.

The forum was conducted to achieve the following objectives:

- An increased understanding of the RD&E projects and activities undertaken by farming groups from across the state
- Greater sharing of resources and knowledge between farming groups, industry and government representatives through new and existing contacts and networks
- Learn new skills particularly in relation to communication of project outcomes, collaboration with NRM, leadership in regional communities and developing capacity for delivering RD&E in regional areas.

Participants

A total of 96 delegates attended the forum over the Thursday and Friday. This was made up of a mix of farmer group employees and contractors, farmer committee members, natural resource management and primary industries agency staff and agricultural industry representatives.

Day One - 70

Dinner - 74

Day Two - 64

Evaluation Methodology

Two methods were used to evaluate the forum. These were:

- Comment sheets on flipcharts where participants could use sticky notes to provide feed back the forum in general as well as the presented draft Strategic Plan
- Two on line surveys were posted on Survey Monkey for participants to complete at the end
 of days one and two of the forum. Participants were able to access the surveys via a QR
 code as well as hard copies provided on tables at the forum.

Results and Discussion

Day One

Day One featured a number of speakers across various platforms. Tim Hermann, DEWNR, kicked off the proceedings with a presentation on 'Land Management Surveys' with a focus on how farm practices have changed over the past 20 years. Following on, Mark Stanley and the 'Pathways to Grain & NRM' team gave an overview of their project focusing on integrated weed management in both the Northern & Yorke and Mallee regions, and integrated sandy soil management in the Mallee. The presentation also addressed 'Improving production and management on the dune/ swale systems of Upper and Eastern Eyre Peninsula. Further supporting the importance of NRM, presentations were also delivered by Eliza Reiger, NRM MDB and Nicole Bennett, NRM AML. By far the most popular topic of the day with over 60% of the audience rating as 'very valuable', was 'The Importance of Work Health & Safety Practices'. Presented by Thea Birss, Mellor Olsson and Paul Daniels, Ag in Compliance, this important issue generated great debate. David Evans gave delegates a summary of 'How Grain Growers LTD Support Grower Groups' and Harm van Rees gave an insightful presentation on the 'Farm4Prophet project, a guide to managing whole farm business risk in Australia.


- Use checklist: presented facets I'd not considered. Unfortunately, the day 1 program was



Day Two





Both 'Volunteer Reliance' and 'Beyond Survival' were perceived as the most valuable grower group topics / presentations. The afternoon session had a clear favourite in Ag Victoria's, Dale Grey. Dale's presentation focussed on 'Simplifying Climate Change' with both a serious-minded and comical point of view. Both GRDC's Stephen Loss, and University of Adelaide Blueprint Manager, Stephen Lee also delivered relevant and well presented sessions. Their topics focussed on 'How Grower Groups fit in to the new GRDC Regional Model' and the 'SA Sheep Industry Blueprint and new MLA Regional Engagement Program', respectively.


