Overview

The SA Division of the Agricultural Institute of Australia (AIA), in partnership with the Australian Association of Animal Sciences (SA Branch) and Adelaide University Agriculture Students Association (AUASA) have a keen focus on supporting the development of students and early career professionals' in having an enjoyable, productive and rewarding educational experience, while laying a solid career foundation.

As one of many initiatives, we've compiled this Student Compendium as a one stop shop / single entry point / checklist for students to avail themselves of;

- Industry experience and connections,
- Network and relationship building opportunities,
- Experience in writing an application to selection criteria,
- Preparing and presenting yourself for interview,
- Engagement in productive and stimulating "social events",
- Something of substance to add to the CV,
- A conversational interest to future employers to consider / discuss on interview,
- Potential media experience and coverage to future employers,
- An opportunity to build towards an exciting career.

In many cases, there is an opportunity to gain some financial support, although minor, to the many benefits and value listed above.

The Student Compendium will further support students who have thought about and acted on their work experience and training early in their study (ie. Year 11/12 and 1st / 2nd year at Uni), as 'It's not always what you know, it's often who you know and the experiences you've initiated for yourself that helps!'

However, if yourself, your family & friends, High School, University Course supervisors and counsellors haven't encouraged, supported, mentored you to gain work experience and build relationships over the last 5-6 years, then there is a bit of catch-up to do, but it is still do-able. You will fall on your feet if you take action now to capture the many opportunities that are available for students.

Some tips on laying the foundation for life's journey

1. **Education;** (high school, tertiary and post graduate)
 - You've learnt how to learn, developed networks, and shaped your passion, thus far.
 - There is always post graduate studies such as Honours / Masters / PhD to continue this.
2. **Work Experience;** of any form, and for any period is invaluable.
3. **Extra-curricular activities and interests;** (building your network and outreach)
 - Junior Heifer Expo, SA Sheep Expo, Led Steer Team, Merino SA Wether Challenge.
 - National Merino Challenge, Inter-Collegiate Meat Judging (ICMJ), Ag Shows – lots of different roles.
 - Vacation work experience – diversity is the key in agriculture, business, sport. It should be external to own family business, and not just 4yrs @ McDonald's, but if so for financial and convenience reasons, then demonstrate increased responsibility, financial accountability, and progression.
 - Competitions, awards, bursaries, scholarships (eg. LambEx Young Guns (2014, 2016, 2018), AIA Student Awards, Horizon Scholarships, AgXtra Crop Competition, Rural Ambassador).
 - National or world travel (for education / experience, not just as a tourist).
 - Take on a leadership, communications or financial role in "any" organisation - local, regional, state or national (eg. AIA- SA Division, AUASA:Growing the Future, Breed Societies, Sport Club, Service Organisation, Volunteer Group).
 - Business development and management – explore and develop your own business on the side.

4. Join a Group / Organisation / Volunteer Society, such as:

- A Farming System Group – there are 15 in SA as part of Ag Ex Alliance, and many more nationally.
- Local Agricultural Bureau of South Australia Branches (30 in SA, 800 members).
- Youth / Next Generation organisations.
- A professional society (student membership is low or often gratis), and attend their annual conference and participate in their competitions, eg.
 - Agriculture Institute of Australia (AIA),
 - Australian Association of Animal Sciences (AAAS),
 - Australasia – Pacific Extension Network (APEN),
 - Grasslands Society of Southern Australia (GSSA).

5. Other supportive and connected training / education opportunities:

- VET: Certificate IV – Workplace Training and Assessment (TAFE SA and other Service Providers)
- Graduate Certificate in Rural Science (Agricultural Consulting -University of New England)
- Master of Agribusiness (University of Adelaide)

AIA – SA Division 2023 Student Compendium Internship(s)

The AIA-SA & AUASA student compendium internship seeks to engage with up to 3 (three) Undergraduate Agricultural/Animal Sciences / Agribusiness students to;

- provide an opportunity for undergraduate students to accrue a portion of the compulsory work experience / internship requirement (especially for students endeavouring to gain intelligence in network building, mentoring, working in a team, project management, survey techniques, hard and e-copy resource development and production and media and scientific conference writing),
- allow the AIA (SA) and AUASA an opportunity to aggregate & collate important information in the preparation of the 2023 Student Compendium,
- provide an opportunity for AIA(SA) and Adelaide University Agricultural Student’s Association (AUASA) to formally work together,
- ensure the needs / wants of students are front of mind for AIA-SA, and gain from new ideas, energy and a fresh perspective. Identify and attract future talent.

This internship is carried out over the summer break ensuring the Compendium is ready for “O” Week. It will be approximately 80 hours each (at the students own negotiated pace/contribution) with students receiving a monthly “Stipend” for their contribution to the internship. This is not a paid role with respect to work cover, superannuation, WHS/OHS, professional liability or public liability, and the students are covered by the University of Adelaide’s Insurance. We offer a flexible “working” environment to allow activities to be conducted, including working from home office facilities.

Students will be members of the AIA (eligible students can access free membership), and nominations / volunteers will be sought from the Executive or membership of AUASA. The successful candidate(s) will demonstrate excellent communication skills, an inquiring mind, a genuine future interest in Agriculture, whether it be research, development and extension/ adoption services. An affinity with or appreciation for rural industry, and an interest in understanding issues facing South Australian agriculture is essential.

The SA Division of the Agricultural Institute of Australia (AIA-SA) and AUASA have a keen focus on supporting the development of students and early career professionals in their life journey of having an enjoyable, productive and rewarding educational experience, while laying a solid foundation for their career.

National Farmers Federation - AgCAREERSTART

This is a structured program that introduces young Australians to a career in agriculture. It is a new gap year program for Australian agriculture. It will set you up for a long-term, rewarding career in agriculture. Over 12 months, it will provide you with a job, training and development, and the opportunity to participate in a broad range of opportunities in Australian agriculture.

AgCAREERSTART is being delivered by the National Farmers' Federation, in conjunction with diverse partners, including *AgriFutures, Primary Industries Education Foundation of Australia, Cotton Australia, Dairy Australia, GrainGrowers Limited, NSW Farmers, NT Farmers, Primary Producers SA and Victorian Farmers' Federation*. AgCAREERSTART, is for 18-25 years of age.

AgCAREERSTART is committed to a positive and rewarding experience for all participants. Participants will be provided basic safety training and will be supported with a grant for vocational training relevant to your farm and interests. This will lay the groundwork for career development in the sector. The program also strives to integrate participants into broader agricultural and regional networks. You will be encouraged to attend significant industry events across the country such as NFF Conference, AgFEST, AgQuip and other events in your local community.

There will be two pilot intakes, one in early 2022 and a second towards the start of 2023. Placements will last for up to twelve months. If you're interested in more information as a gap year participant or on-farm host, you can register your details here:

Eyre Peninsula internship in applied grains research

The EP internship program is funded by SAGIT, and aims to improve the capacity of grains research, development and extension (RD&E) in the Eyre Peninsula region, by further developing applied research skills of recent graduates.

AIR EP will annually engage a recent graduate to work as an intern/trainee in applied grains RD&E, located on Eyre Peninsula, pending funding.

During the 12 months (February-January) the intern/trainee will gain skills in trial design, trial management, sampling, statistical analysis, general crop agronomy, extension practices including written and oral communication with growers and advisors and event delivery. They will also have the opportunity to network and attend industry events (eg GRDC Updates).

The intern will work with local research organisations including EPAG Research, based in Port Lincoln and SARDI Minnipa Agricultural Centre, as well as local independent consultants. During the 12 months the Intern will run a small research project, where they design, implement, analyse and write up a field trial relevant to growers in the region.

The intern will gain experience working across a range of research projects that AIR EP, EPAG Research and SARDI are currently delivering.

The annual premier event from the Adelaide University Agricultural Students Association (AUASA) is a career's night with a difference. Usually held in August at the Adelaide Oval, this event is an opportunity for SA's agriculturally minded, to connect over a three course meal, networking sessions and panels featuring a range of industry professionals. The 2021 Growing the Future included a "Speed-Dating" with sponsors session where close to 30 agribusinesses sent representatives to discuss their opportunities and answer any questions to the attendees ranging from university/high school students to young farmers and anyone interested in ag, which rotated after a short period of time. Adelaide University Agriculture Student's Association Plant the Seed of Your Career Mentoring Program

It has been recognised for some time that a plethora of career opportunities exist for agriculture graduates; however, many of these remain unknown or inaccessible to soon-to-be graduates. Consequently, students are completing their tertiary study with little idea of the opportunities available, or without knowing how to enter their desired career pathway. In 2020, the AUASA President recognised this gap and took the opportunity to brainstorm with South Australian leaders in agriculture to address this issue. The result of this meeting was the development of a pilot mentoring program: *Plant the seed of your career*.

This mentoring program is offered to third year students of agricultural science at the University of Adelaide. Applications involve written and video components, and successful applicants are paired with renowned leaders in the Australian agricultural industry who can assist the student with professional development and guide them as they prepare to enter the industry and identify the career pathway they desire to pursue.

MENTEE COMMITMENT

- Minimum of two hours per month of one-on one sessions with your mentor,
- Attendance at: - Facilitated orientation session in April - Check in session with your fellow mentees and mentors in August - Program graduation in October/November,
- At least four days of work experience, provided by your mentor, if applicable,
- Further development opportunities, such as attendance at field days, meetings etc.

MENTOR COMMITMENT

- Minimum of two hours per month of one-on one sessions with mentees,
- Attendance at: - Facilitated orientation session in April - Check in session with your fellow mentors and mentees in August - Program graduation in October/November,
- Provide at least four days of work experience for mentee, if applicable,
- Recommend and/or facilitate further development opportunities, such as attendance at field days, meetings, etc.

An industry program is connecting university students and horticultural businesses to build capacity and develop future leaders.

The Graduate Engagement Program, delivered by Rimfire Resources, Australian Rural Leadership Foundation and Hort Innovation, involves a 10-week internship during a student's final year of study which can be completed in a single block over summer or part-time through the year in single or multiple blocks, to suit the student and host company. The student receives a minimum of \$8,000 in wages or scholarship. After they have graduated, the business can invite participants to complete a one-year graduate program.

After a successful internship and on the completion of the students studies, the student commences a 12-month graduate position with the host company as an employee. This phase includes the highly regarded Australian Rural Leadership Foundation (ARLP), "Introduction to Leadership" 4-day residential development course and all associated travel, accommodation and meals are fully covered.

Thorndon Park Produce - “Feed the Need program”

Run by SA Vegetable Grower and Supplier Anthony De Ieso, Thorndon Park Produce is a family run vegetable grower and supplier to local SA wholesale markets, supermarkets, interstate markets, processors and local retailers.

This program allows students to gain hands on experience planting or working on a crop and learning the very basics of growing. After the hands on component is done, various members across industry such as agronomists, supply reps and researchers are invited to have a network session with the students. This 5 hour program provides a great foundation for students to begin looking at their options outside of university to advance their future careers in Horticulture.

Students who complete the program will become a part of the Feed the Need network group and will be offered various chances at work experience.

The program has helped various participants with their careers after their studies are complete, resulting in some students gaining fulltime employment in the field.

The Agricultural Extension Industry

What is extension?

Agricultural extension uses the results of social science research to encourage the adoption of new technical research. It involves working with the ‘whole farm’, not just certain parts of the farm, and ensures the ‘human element’ (how people change) is considered in the delivery of projects.

The Australian Pacific Extension Network (APEN), define extension as:

“Extension is working with people in a community to facilitate change in an environment that has social, economic and technical complexity. This is achieved by helping people gain the knowledge and confidence, so they see the need for change; and providing support to ensure it is implemented.”

Successful agricultural extension professionals use a range of different social science skills to be successful at their job. This includes skills in change management, communication, project management, event management, teaching and learning, and facilitation.

Agricultural Extension professionals tend to work with groups of landholders, rather than just one-on-one with a farmer. The power of ‘group learning’ is unleashed using agricultural extension skills. By working with groups of farmers agricultural extension professionals facilitate change across the whole farm or landscape, rather than in just one paddock.

Agricultural Extension is also on-going. Relationships are formed between farmers and agricultural extension professionals over two or three years, or longer. This allows the extension professional to provide support on an on-going basis as the farm business adopts / implements new technologies or tools. The extension professional is there to answer questions and solve problems together.

What roles are available in extension?

Anyone who works with farmers, who communicates research to farmers, or wants to encourage farming families to try new things works in extension.

Roles you could do include:

Extension Officer	Sustainable Agriculture Officer	Project manager
Industry Development Officer	Communications Officer	Trials Agronomist
Research communications	Animal Health Officer	Biosecurity Officer
Landholder liaison officer	Project officer (either with State Government or a Grower Group)	

How do I get a job in agricultural extension?

There are several ways in which you can enter the agricultural extension industry. Most agricultural extension professionals have started jobs within the State Department of Agriculture, NRM boards, grower groups, or as project officers for industry bodies. However, any graduate role within agriculture will lead you into the agricultural extension industry.

I have excellent technical skills, so how can I build my skills in agricultural extension?

Like any area of professional expertise, you need to keep up-to-date with your training to ensure you are providing the best service to the industry.

ACIAR Graduate Development Program (Postponed in 2022)

Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research seeks to build our future capacity by engaging young Australian agricultural research scientists in a 12 month, non-ongoing experiential Graduate Program.

The Program provides a unique work experience opportunity for Australian university graduates with an interest in international agricultural research and policy development.

The successful graduate will be mentored for the duration of the program by a number of Research Program Managers (RPM) from different research disciplines, providing an experience for the graduate to enable the development for possible roles within international agricultural research institutions in Australia and internationally.

Our research programs utilise collaborative partnerships to improve the profitability and sustainability of agricultural production systems through facilitation and funding of collaborative research between developing countries and Australia.

Graduates have responsibility for assisting RPM's with developing and supporting a portfolio of research for development projects commissioned by ACIAR. The projects involve research institutions in Australia, developing countries and international agricultural research centres carrying out agricultural research within ACIAR's geographical mandate area. Graduates gain the opportunity to improve project management and coordination skills over the 12 month program.

ACIAR does not do research, so this is not a lab position. This is a hands-on program management development role with a range of interactions with key stakeholders, exposing our graduates to an office environment (based in Canberra) and opportunities to travel to developing countries to visit relevant project sites and teams. The role is initially for a 12 month non-ongoing period, with a possibility of a 12 month non-ongoing research officer role, the maximum employment period would be 2 years.

Herefords Australia: CM Hocking Scholarship

In 2002, Hereford Australia received a significant legacy from the estate of the late Mrs CM (Madge) Hocking to provide an ongoing annual scholarship bursary for Australian citizens undertaking studies that will benefit the Australian Hereford industry. The legacy was invested and yields around \$5,000 a year to fund the bursary.

Mrs Hocking along with her husband 'Hock' (who worked with Dalgety New Zealand Loan at Geelong), began breeding Herefords on the family farm "Oakdene", near the seaside resort of Ocean Grove in the early 1960s. Oakdene is now the home of an award-winning winery, up-market restaurant and function centre of the same name. Another part of the property has been subdivided for a large residential development known as Oakdene Estate.

The late Mrs Hocking was devoted to her Hereford cattle and the betterment of the breed. Never satisfied, Mrs Hocking worked tirelessly to improve her herd buying bulls from studs such as South Boorook, Ardno, Midgeon and Golf Hill. In 1975 she purchased the first of many Hereford bulls at the then huge Sydney Royal sales. The Oakdene Herefords had an outstanding reputation regularly topping Melbourne's Newmarket saleyards. Recognised as having a good eye for cattle, she was always keen to pass her knowledge on to the next generation.

The CM Hocking Scholarship embodies her love of Herefords and her keen interest in young people.

The bequest was her way of saying 'Thank You' to the Hereford breed.

Applications will be considered from Australian citizens who are undertaking a course of study that will be applied to the breeding, care and maintenance of Hereford cattle and/or will be of benefit to the Australian Hereford industry.

The successful applicant will receive a top-up scholarship of \$10,000 per year, regardless of the value or existence of a student's base scholarship, for a maximum of 3.5 years (extensions may be granted in exceptional circumstances). The scholarship is dependent on continued satisfactory university approved progress and performance.

Fight Food Waste CRC

Food waste represents a massive global challenge on an environmental, social and economic level. In Australia, it's estimated that 7.6 million tonnes are wasted annually, at a cost of nearly \$37 billion.

To help in Australia's fight against food waste, the 10-year Fight Food Waste Cooperative Research Centre (CRC) was established in 2018 through funding from the Australian Government's Cooperative Research Centre Program. The Fight Food Waste CRC is now the largest dedicated food waste research and development organisation in the world.

By bringing together industry, research and the community, the Fight Food Waste CRC plays a major role in Australia meeting its stated goal of halving food waste by 2030, while also aligning with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goal 12.3 for the world to achieve a similar target.

There are opportunities for PhD and Masters students to take part in the CRC's education program, with SA based opportunities through the University of Adelaide and SARDI. Top-up scholarships valued at up to \$100,000 are available for 4-year PhDs to supplement the base scholarship from a participating university, and 2-year Masters by Research full scholarships are valued at \$50,000.

Additionally, Fight Food Waste CRC postgraduate students are part of the Future Leaders Program, a personal and professional development program which includes regular training events, student retreats, and the ability to connect and learn from other FFW CRC students.

Young Scientist Award

Animal Production Science (APS) offers a Young Scientist Award for the best oral or poster paper presented at the biennial conferences of the Association for the Advancement of Animal Breeding and Genetics (AAABG) and Australian Association of Animal Sciences (AAAS).

APS has a focus on improving livestock and food production, and on the social and economic issues that influence primary producers. The journal (formerly known as *Australian Journal of Experimental Agriculture*) is predominantly concerned with domesticated animals (beef cattle, dairy cows, sheep, pigs, goats and poultry); however, contributions on horses and wild animals may be published where relevant.

The award carries a prize of a personal one-year print subscription to Animal Production Science, an AU\$250 book voucher from CSIRO Publishing and a certificate.

To be eligible for the prize, the first author must be no more than 10 years post-PhD and <35 years old, and a member of the relevant society.

Authors are asked to nominate whether a paper is suitable for consideration for the award. Nominations are then judged by the Executive Committee of the Society and an Editor, with a winner to be selected.

The winner of the award(s) will be announced at the conclusion of the conference and in an Editorial published in the journal.

The Commonwealth Hill Scholarship

The Commonwealth Hill Scholarship is awarded approximately once every three years to support a full time PhD or Masters student who is commencing research in the field of Agricultural Science.

While the Graduate Certificate was initially developed for agricultural consultants (and named accordingly), it is just as applicable for professional farm managers, farm management, agricultural consulting/extension /advisory roles or other jobs that require professional farm management knowledge. It is applicable to all agricultural sectors. This distance education unit suits professionals already working, but can be studied within other courses along with a number of other external units.

This Certificate provides two discrete modules for agricultural consultants to assist their clients' businesses or for farm managers to run their own business. The first module covers Whole of Enterprise Planning, allowing the business to be viewed in an integrated manner including farm resources, production and finances. The second module improves the skill of the consultant in dealing with their clients or farm managers dealing with staff and contractors, covering the essential tools of communication, facilitation and negotiation. Managers of corporate farms, those who take on industry leadership roles (e.g. in various committees) and those whose expertise sees them as invited speakers at events and field days, will find these skills particularly useful.

Soil Science Australia – Soil Judging Competition

Soil judging competitions involve university students competing to correctly identify soil features, classify soil profiles, and interpret soil capability. The first Australian soil judging competition was held in conjunction with Soil Science Australia’s National Soils Conference in Hobart in 2012, with teams from five states competing. An Australian team competed in the International Soil Judging Competition held in conjunction with the World Congress of Soil Science in Korea in 2014, and the 2017 competition held in Toowoomba Queensland included a record 12 teams, including two New Zealand teams.

Soil Science Australia runs a national soil judging competition and individual branches support teams from their state. In 2021, the competition was held in Cairns and a team of 5 students represented the University of Adelaide along with 11 other teams from around the country. It consisted of two days of intense one on one, field-based training provided by senior soil scientists and a culminated competition on the third day. On competition day, students worked as a team to identify characteristics such as soil horizons, proportions of clay, silt and sand, the soil chemistry by colour, how the soil formed by the surrounding geology and ran a series of calculations to determine its suitability.

SA Junior Heifer Expo (July, Adelaide)

The concept and establishment of the Expo was the initiative of a dedicated and visionary group of South Australian beef cattle producers, who recognised the potential long and short-term benefits of such an event. These breeders felt the future of the Australian beef industry would be enhanced through the education and encouragement of our youth to become active, constructive and enthusiastic participants within the industry. The inaugural Expo was staged in 1985 and from humble beginnings it has grown to its present status. The average participation rate is now around 180 junior community members per year ranging from 8 to 23 years of age. Over 4200 have entered this event since its beginning. They have come from all states of Australia as well as New Zealand. The major annual award at the Expo is a scholarship for a four month study tour of North America, which is awarded to the Senior Champion Herdsman. This acts as a huge incentive, enticing many participants to return year after year. As testimonial to the events original objective, a large number of the participants have gone on to take up very prominent and responsible positions within the beef industry and the community in general.

Participants are required to have a heifer or steer that they work with over the 4 days of the event. A supply network assists those who do not have immediate access to a suitable animal. Expo participants and their livestock are accommodated at the Adelaide Showground at Wayville, during the event, to undertake the full and comprehensive program. This along with responsible leaders and the age variation "buddy" system ensures participants gain maximum benefit from their participation. Besides the educational benefits, numerous lifelong friendships have been established as a direct result of meeting at this Expo.

The SA Junior Heifer Expo will be held from 18th-21st of July 2022 at the Adelaide Showgrounds. Entries for the 2022 event open in April.

National Merino Challenge (May: NSW, SA, Vic. Postponed for 2022)

(AUASA Sponsor)

The NMC is an Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) initiative designed to allow young people to engage with the Merino industry by developing their knowledge, skills and networks, and involves presentations and demonstrations from industry professionals. Students participate in seven 'mini-challenges' over two days, testing their knowledge of Merino fleece, production, breeding and selection.

Techniques from several well-known industry initiatives, such as MERINOSELECT, Lifetime Wool and Visual Sheep Scores, are used throughout the NMC, giving students a realistic and practical insight into the tools available to growers to make more informed decisions.

The Challenge has two sections – late secondary and tertiary – and is open to years 11 and 12 and tertiary students, Australia-wide. The tertiary sector includes university students and those studying through TAFE or another RTO.

The NMC provides teachers with materials and techniques to prepare their students for the Challenge, as well as providing the students with materials they can use to get ready for the NMC.

Students can choose to do as much or as little work in the lead up to the NMC as they like. Materials are provided to all participants and their teachers to create a more even playing field.

Students are required to attend the two-day workshop, which incorporates an industry dinner to allow them to meet key industry figures and have a bit of fun!

- Contribution to agriculture in general,
- Must meet AIA ethics policy standards,
- A maximum of one award per year. The award may not be made every year.

Form of Award

- The Award – a certificate and free AIA membership for 12 months,
- The awardee is required to provide a suitable paper for publication in the AIA Agricultural Science Journal and deliver a presentation at an AIA forum to be determined with awardee.

THE PITCH: LambEx wants to hear YOUR vision on how to connect the Australian sheep and lamb industry with city consumers.

ENTRY: LambEx Young Guns may be on-farm, working in agriculture or agribusiness, studying and/or passionate about a strong future for Australia's lamb and sheep industry with the ability to clearly and creatively address the pitch. Ages 18 to 35 years are eligible to apply.

Six finalists selected from round one will continue through to round two held during LambEx. Finalists will be provided opportunities to develop their communication and presentation skills; increase their industry contacts; and participate in a mentoring program during the event days. Finalists will also be offered a complimentary conference ticket and a travel allowance.

HOW TO ENTER: Prepare your entry of up to three minutes in length using any digital medium(s) including (but not limited to) video, photography with voice overlay, digital storytelling, graphics, animation, gopro etc to share your vision on how to better connect the Australian sheep and lamb industry with city consumers.

Each entry will be judged on the following criteria:

- Realistic potential for the vision to be adopted by industry,
- Ability to concisely convey message,
- Quality of content and production,
- Creativity.

BeefEx / SmartBeef: Communicate Your Research Competition (October)

BeefEx (in odd years) attracts over 500 delegates for a celebration and showcase of the feedlot sector. It involves multiple networking opportunities and a program that features speakers on 'big picture' topics. It draws together feedlot operators and their staff, nutritionists, veterinarians, regulators, service providers and others involved in the grain fed beef supply chain.

SmartBeef (in even years) attracts over 300 delegates for a 'ground level' technically focused conference that incorporates both plenary and practical sessions. (eg. big data, consumer trends, markets, economics, production, finance and leadership).

Both conferences profile and reward leaders in the industry, with presentations including the Feedlot of the Year Award, Young Lot Feeder of the Year Award, Excellence in Feedlot Education Medal, Top Gun Award, Innovation/Innovator of the Year Award and Communicate Your Research Competition.

The Communicate Your Research Competition is designed to promote excellence and scientific professionalism for the advancement of communication between tertiary institutions and the Australian cattle feedlot industry. The competition aims to provide students an opportunity to share their research in relevant intensive animal and veterinary science disciplines with the Australian feedlot industry.

Students are asked to deliver a 5-minute oral presentation with an accompanying slide deck on their research to a judging panel that holds a broad understanding of the beef industry.

Students then share their research via a poster session to the conference delegation where they may field questions from attendees. Students are required to prepare a poster as outlined in the guidelines.

Entrants must be undergraduate or postgraduate tertiary students currently enrolled in a field related to the beef industry that may encompass nutrition, meat science, genetics, animal welfare, veterinary science, agribusiness, or agricultural leadership. There is no age restriction.

The research topic and presentation must be of relevance to the feedlot industry. Research conducted in production animals that could be adopted by the feedlot industry is appropriate.

Angus Youth

Angus Youth is the junior activities division of Angus Australia. It is currently one of the largest and most active breed youth groups in the country. Angus Youth offers many opportunities to its member through its extensive education and scholarship programs.

Angus Youth members have the opportunity to apply for scholarships, awards and bursaries to industry leading conferences and events, take part in educational leadership programs as well as attending the Angus Youth National Roundup.

The Angus Youth National Roundup is considered the largest single breed cattle show for young people in Australia and provides a four day educational workshop with opportunities to judge cattle, parade cattle and create networks all over Australia.

South Australian No-Till Farmers Association (SANTFA)

There have been many technological advances in broadacre farming over the last decade. Reduced tillage farming systems have been a key part of this change, however the adoption of these changes for many farmers has not been altogether smooth. The South Australian No-Till Farmers Association (SANTFA) is a non-profit farmer driven organisation that is led by a committee of volunteers. SANTFA has successfully promoted the benefits of no-till farming systems and conservation farming.

With conservation agriculture in action as front of mind, SANTFA is committed to no-till systems and to pushing the limits on equipment design and system advances and they conduct and coordinate independent research through a range of contractors. They recognise that they are part of a wider farming systems focus in many regions and seek to be a significant influence on research conducted by others and take care not to duplicate the activities of existing Farming Systems Groups.

SANTFA provides education and information for growers being introduced to no-till as well as growers who require advanced support via an annual conference (Feb), crop walks (winter), trials and webinars. In both cases, they continue to focus on options that enable members to meet the triple bottom line outcomes of economic, environmental and social sustainability.

SA Sheep Industry Fund (SIF)

The SA Sheep Industry Fund was established in 1999. SIF provides a broad range of benefits to South Australian sheep producers via the programs and projects it supports. All sheep owners in South Australia currently contribute \$0.67 per head to the Sheep Industry Fund when 5 or more sheep are sold for \$5 per head or more.

This contribution comprises 2 parts:

- a general contribution of \$0.55
- a dog fence rebuild contribution of \$0.12.

The SIF collects approximately \$4 million in contributions annually.

The independent SIF Board comprises of six fund contributors. It is responsible for deciding which projects should be supported and administering the associated project expenditure, contracts and reporting. Livestock SA fulfils the administrative functions.

Current SA Sheep Industry Fund projects include:

- The Dog Fence rebuild and maintenance program, wild dog trapping and baiting.
- Animal health programs delivered by the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) that support producers to manage biosecurity risks (eg. footrot, lice and OJD).
- The compliance program for the National Livestock Identification System to assist in traceability and through sale yard inspections.

- Abattoir surveillance of a range of sheep diseases and conditions and producer feedback to support decision making on farm
- Advocacy
- Support for shearer trainees via a starter tool box kit
- Support for young sheep producers via sponsorship of the annual SA Sheep Expo
- A wide range of industry development programs and research that the Sheep Industry Fund Board believes will benefit the industry.

Angaston Agricultural Bureau

Angaston is part of a network of 60 branches across South Australia. Groups meet regularly to exchange ideas, discuss farming practices and issues, work on common challenges together and help to bridge the gap between scientist and farmer. It is a not-for-profit organisation run by farmers for farmers. Membership is for everyone associated with or interested in farming, agricultural development and education.

Angaston has a recognised reputation of supporting high school and University students, young early career professionals and Next Generation's career development via major projects such as;

- Schools Merino Challenge (for 6-8 local Agricultural High Schools),
- Attendance and travel Bursaries for the SA Sheep Expo,
- Support via training of local students in The Merino SA Wether Challenge,
- Offering work experience to keen High School and University students,
- Various mentoring programs,
- Hosting groups / bus-loads of students from the University of Adelaide,
- Travel bursaries to attend Industry Conferences such as LambEx and State Landcare Conference,
- Training course's bursaries, eg MLA's: Gra\$\$ to Dollars.

The Angaston Bureau meets on the first Tuesday of the month, with meetings with a guest speaker held in local halls or venues, or on location for 'sticky-beak' evenings including tours of member's properties, or local businesses, and annual bus trip to other districts and regional workshops and forums.

The member base is as diverse as the program, with participants involved in vineyards, cropping, meat and wool sheep, beef and dairy cattle, fresh and dried fruit production, transport and contracting services and agribusiness. This diversity skill, knowledge and interest has been ideal in assisting in the establishment of the Barossa Improved Grazing Group (BIGG) in 2012. <https://biggroup.org.au/>
