The University of Adelaide: Host Waite & Roseworthy Internships

A requirement of the University of Adelaide agriculture (Waite) and animal-based (Roseworthy) degrees is to complete a set number of internships or placement hours within industry. The 2024 Student Compendium provides a one-stop-shop for students to identify internship opportunities that align with their interests.

If your agricultural business can host a student to complete a proportion of their required industry hours, the University of Adelaide team will coordinate the relevant paperwork and agreements to cover off on responsibilities, agreed tasks, timing, confidentiality, intellectual property and insurance. As students undertake internships as part of their university studies, they are generally a vocational placement under the Fair Work Act.

They ask hosts to provide interns with a project or tasks of relevance to your business or industry, suitable work space and facilities, on site supervision, health and safety induction on commencement, and feedback on the student's performance.

SA Government: Vocational Education & Training (VET) for schools

The SA Government's Vocational Education and Training (VET) program for school students brings industry and schools together to enhance career education and improve outcomes for students and employers. This program details flexible industry pathways to employment in key growth industries in SA. These pathways map out a student's journey through secondary school to employment via career education, industry immersion, school-based apprenticeships, traineeships and formal qualifications. Co-designing VET offerings with industry delivers quality VET that is relevant to the needs of employers, while setting students up for sustainable and meaningful careers.

Stackable VET options are short courses delivered within a school timetable. They provide students with prevocational skills, work preparedness, and the opportunity to try different areas before committing to a pathway, or provide advanced skills to support students to progress through their pathway. They can be stacked with multiple options for students to explore different areas while developing their skills for work.

Skills Cluster comprise a cluster of accredited units of competence aligned to industry requirements, supporting students to develop competency and skills, counting toward a full qualification. They can be:

- Pre-employment industry licensing to meet specific industry requirements.
- Introduction Skills Clusters to help students explore the pathway and VET environment. In addition, they may provide credit transfer in Certificate level II qualifications.
- Advanced Skills Clusters for post VET students wishing to continue their employment pathway.
- Skill Sets nationally accredited skill sets that are recognised as suitable for school students.

Flexible Industry Pathways (FIP's) are industry endorsed pathways from secondary school to employment in key growth sectors in South Australia. They include:

- Compulsory SACE subjects and contextualised delivery of other subjects enabling students to complete a VET qualification and SACE concurrently.
- VET qualifications at Certificate II and III level.
- Employability skills training delivered through SACE.
- Industry-specific requirements, eg White Card, RSA, First Aid.

FIP's ensure students are job-ready while providing industry with skilled workers. Students can explore the FIP's through the Student Pathways website or view the 2024 Vocational Education and Training (VET) Courses for School Students on the Department for Education website.

Students can gain credit toward Apprenticeships and Traineeships (both school-based and part-time). Students are able to experience a range of pathways including, but not limited to:

- Agriculture,
- Animal Care,
- · Aquaculture,
- Conservation and Land Management,
- Forestry,
- Horticulture.

VET courses can lead to further study at TAFE or University (including adding to an ATAR score) and/or directly into employment.

They are, ultimately, teachers helping teachers. During the 2022-2023 period, PIEFA engaged with over **2,500 schools** and over **11,000 teachers**. Adelaide University Agricultural Students' Association 'Plant the Seed of Your Career' Mentoring Program

It has long been recognised that a plethora of career opportunities exist for agriculture graduates; however many of these remain unknown or inaccessible. Consequently, students are completing their tertiary study with little idea of the opportunities available, or without knowing how to enter their desired career pathway.

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In 2020, the AUASA President recognised this gap and created a pilot mentoring program: *Plant the Seed of Your Career.* This mentoring

program is offered to third year students of agricultural science at the University of Adelaide. Applications involve written and video components, and successful applicants are paired with renowned leaders in the Australian agricultural industry who can assist the student with professional development and guide them as they prepare to enter the industry and identify the career pathway they desire to pursue.

Mentee commitment:

- Minimum of two hours per month of one-on one sessions with your mentor,
- Attendance at: Facilitated orientation session at start of program, check in session with your fellow mentees and mentors mid-program and program graduation in October,
- At least four days of work experience, provided by your mentor, if applicable,
- Further development opportunities, such as attendance at field days, meetings etc.

Mentor commitment:

- Minimum of two hours per month of one-on one sessions with mentees,
- Attendance at: Facilitated orientation session at start of program, check in session with your fellow mentees and mentors mid-program and program graduation in October,
- Provide at least four days of work experience for mentee, if applicable,
- Recommend/facilitate further development opportunities.



The Agricultural Extension Industry

Agricultural extension uses the results of social science research to encourage the adoption of new technical research. It involves working with the 'whole farm' and ensures the 'human element' is considered in the delivery of projects. Effective ag extension professionals use a range of skills including change management, communication, project and event management, teaching and facilitation to be successful in their roles. Ag extension professionals often work with groups of landholders, allowing change to be facilitated across the whole farm or landscape, rather than just one paddock. Ag extension is also an on-going process with relationships forming over a much longer time, allowing for provision of on-going support as the farm business adopts/implements new technologies or tools.

There are a number of extension roles existing including Extension Officer, Industry Development Officer, Landholder Liaison Officer, Sustainable Agriculture Officer, Communications Officer, Animal Health Officer, Project Officer/Manager, Trials Agronomist and Biosecurity Officer.

There are several ways in which to enter the agricultural extension industry. Most ag extension professionals have started jobs within the State Department of Agricultura, NRM boards, grower groups, or as project officers for industry bodies. However, any graduate role with agriculture will lead you into the agricultural extension industry.

The AgXtra Crop Competition is a small-scale simulation of a real-life broadacre cropping scenario, tailored for second-year Agricultural Science students. The competition empowers students to apply their theoretical knowledge in a practical setting. Teams of 4-6 participants are tasked with selecting a wheat variety, optimal sowing rates and specifying nutrition and crop protection management strategies. AgXtra facilitates the competition by providing essential resources including seeding, agronomic treatment applications and harvest, as well as paddock location, cropping history and soil tests including deep N, and Predicta-B results.

Entries into the competition are evaluated through multiple analyses including grain yield, quality, and gross margin. The competition puts students' skills to the test and fosters teamwork, strategic thinking, and the application of theoretical concepts in a hands-on agricultural context.

How to support someone who is having a tough time

- Ask them about how they are [managing] [coping] [sleeping] [feeling about...] [feeling since...]
 [handling...] to indicate that you care
- Listen carefully, patiently and calmly to what they say, respecting their feelings, thoughts and opinions, even if you do not agree with them
- Allow them to express their feelings and thoughts (even if it makes you feel uncomfortable) but don't force them to do so
- Allow pauses or silence to let them think or gather their thoughts
- If they are very distressed, encourage them to take a few slow, **deep breaths** and do it with them
- Ask them about what they are already doing to help themselves manage
- Praise them for things they are doing that are likely to be helpful (e.g. exercising, speaking to friends and family, healthy eating, taking a break, listening to music, taking deep breaths, cutting back on alcohol)
- Ask them if they have considered using a support service or program - you might suggest ifarmwell - it is free and available 24/7
- Tell them a 'good news story' about someone who has used a particular service/program and found that it helped
- Ask if there is anything you could do to make it easier for them to use the service/program (e.g. help them find the phone number and make an appointment)
- Don't put pressure on yourself to solve their problems (listening to them and linking them in with other support people is enough)
- Follow up at a later date to indicate that you care and that they did the right thing by speaking to you




